
We had a wonderful time at our 1st Book club!

MEMBERSHIP REPORT







ROCKWALL COUNTY UPDATE



First of all, I want to thank you for being a member of the Rockwall County Republican Women's Club. I mentioned in my last article that only a little over 13,000 Republican votes were cast out of 75,000 registered voters in Rockwall County. Please invite your family members and friends to attend a meeting, join and get involved in ensuring that our conservative values continue to be well represented. I also want to remind all that there are other Republican Clubs that meet at many different times through the month to provide more opportunities for all to be involved. There is the Rockwall County Republican Hispanic Club and the Rockwall County Young Republicans as well as the Rockwall County Lunch Bunch. around the corner. Voters in Rockwall ISD have two contested board of trustees positions. The city of Royse City has a contested race, voters in McClendon-Chisholm have a rollback election. Rowlett voters have a contested race for Mayor, two contested full term council positions and a contested special election on an unexpired council term.

Elections in May are not over after the municipal elections! Understanding Chapter 313

Ronald Reagan once said the closest thing to life on earth is a government program. While I love our 40th president, it is time to prove him wrong by protecting taxpayers and not reinstating the tax incentive, crony-capitalism program known as "Chapter 313" in 2023.

The Texas Economic Development Act — Chapter 313 of the Texas Tax Code — offers businesses tax incentives to invest in local economic projects. When passed by the legislature in 2001, the Act aimed to attract capital-intensive (i.e., business manufacturing) projects to the state, given Texas's relatively high property taxes, when compared to other states, by offering a 10-year limitation on the school maintenance and operations (M&O) portion of property taxes.

It was intended to expand and enlarge the ad valorem tax base of the state, as well as increase surrounding local property values. However, like other corporate welfare schemes, its efficacy is unclear. The 87th Legislature wisely chose not to extend the program and left the current Act to expire on December 31, 2022. Concerns persist about its oversight, transparency, and its value to taxpayers. Eligible investments and limitations include:

- Manufacturing;
- research and development;
- electricity generation using low-emission technologies;
- nuclear energy;
- computer data centers; and
- Texas priority projects (those with a qualified investment commitment of more than \$1 billion).

Overview (Comptroller Summary - 2021)

- Of the 509 current and executed agreements, 38 percent are manufacturing, and 61 percent are renewable energy.
- Of the estimated \$217 billion of investments under the 509 agreements, 70.8 percent of the investments are in manufacturing, and 28.8 percent are in renewable energy. Less than 1 percent are in research and development (R&D). Of the 9,116 qualifying jobs committed for creation under the 509 project agreements, 81 percent are in manufacturing and 13.1 percent are in renewable energy. The remaining 5.9 percent are in R&D.

Under Chapter 313, a school district approves a business's application, and the comptroller certifies it. In practice, the comptroller acts as a rubber stamp. The comptroller has wide discretion to approve projects that are "reasonably likely" to generate tax revenue (including all state and local taxes) before the 25th anniversary of the beginning of the limitation period to offset that lost. "Reasonably likely" hardly poses a robust test of a project's durability. Economic projections of this distance are uncertain at best. At a minimum, that timeline should be shortened. Ultimately, the comptroller may approve a limitation if he determines that other considerations associated with the project result in a "net positive benefit to the state," regardless of its economic outlook.

Furthermore, the limitation on appraised value must be a "determining factor" of a business's decision to invest in a site, which is difficult to prove and hardly a rigorous test of "but for" that a company would not locate there absent the incentive. Research suggests that companies often move to the state regardless of the tax abatement on offer. More important are the surrounding infrastructure, local talent, and the presence of a top-tier university.

A project entity must create 25 new qualifying jobs in non-rural school districts and 10 qualifying jobs if located in rural districts (though the entity need not be the direct employer). A school district may waive the new-jobs requirement if it finds it exceeds the industry standard for the number of employees "reasonably necessary" for the operation of the facility. This allows for such broad interpretation so as to be of little application. In practice, minimum job requirements are often waived for renewable energy projects, as most of the attendant labor is not permanent on-site jobs.

A "qualifying job" must offer certain healthcare coverage and pay 110 percent of the surrounding county average weekly manufacturing wage. However, an employer is found in violation only if it fails to meet numerical requirements by at least 10 percent, allowing for leeway in terms of work hours, wage requirements, and health plans. This means the job need only match surrounding industry wages.

Egregiously, most project entities make supplemental payments to school districts in consideration for approving their applications. The sizes of these payments suggest the tax abatement is too generous and is not the primary motivating factor. Such payments frequently exceed 40 percent of the total tax benefits. What is more, these payments exist outside the basic school funding formula, incentivizing districts to approve projects regardless of their merit since state funding to districts is not offset accordingly by the payment amount, which hurts taxpayers.

Oversight is sorely lacking. Each year the state auditor is required to review at least three major agreements for compliance. Given the number of existing agreements, this minimal audit hardly constitutes serious accountability. Thus, we will never know just how much these Chapter 313 agreements have cost the Texas taxpayer.

Chapter 313 delays by 10 years the time when new investments appear on the tax rolls at full value. While it is true that foregone taxes during this time represent revenues that purportedly would not otherwise have been collected, if not for the agreement, it is worth asking if such breaks remain necessary to attract investment, or do they merely represent corporate giveaways to companies that likely would have relocated to the state anyway.

New rules:

In late 2021, the comptroller's office was set to adopt new rules governing these agreements. Amid criticism that these rules would scrap data collection and weaken job reporting requirements, The Comptroller publicly stated he will not adopt them as proposed.

Though Chapter 313 of the Tax Code will expire at the end of 2022, accountability should be no less robust if there are existing agreements. Hundreds of entities are likely to apply before then, and the limitations offered will influence school funding for decades. Information relating to individual agreements must remain broadly accessible to the public.

In public speeches the Speaker of the House, Dade Phelan has signaled his intention to re-authorize Chapter 313 and not allow the program to end. While my preference is for the incentives to end completely, if the Act is to be renewed beyond 2022, reforms must include the more targeted use of incentives and a focus on attracting new investments, as opposed to expansions of existing companies in the state. Additionally, the comptroller must exercise greater oversight of projects granted under this chapter to ensure a clear economic benefit to the state.

The bottom line is, Chapter 313 program is, plain and simple, crony-capitalism. It is not the government's place to pick winners and looser in the public sector. Texas taxpayers deserve better. Time to prove Ronald Reagan wrong by ending the life of a bad government program.

PROPERTY TAX VALUATIONS ARE ON THE WAY

Property Tax Valuations are in the mail and we want to make sure you have all the information you need when looking at appraisals. Some common questions we get in our office are: Why are valuations so high, what can we do about it, and what do we need to watch for?

For starters, we need to look at where in Texas law property tax valuations are outlined: <u>Tax Code Section 23</u>. In statute it states, "Except as otherwise provided by this chapter, all taxable property is appraised at its market value as of January 1. (b) The market value of property shall be determined by the application of generally accepted appraisal methods and techniques. If the appraisal district determines the appraised value of a property using mass

appraisal standards, the mass appraisal standards must comply with the Uniform Standards of Professional Appraisal Practice. The same or similar appraisal methods and techniques shall be used in appraising the same or similar kinds of property. However, each property shall be appraised based upon the individual characteristics that affect the property's market value, and all available evidence that is specific to the value of the property shall be taken into account in determining the property's market value."

With this information in mind, let's take a look at the causes behind our valuations jumping so much this year.

- The Federal Reserve has kept interest rates near zero, making it cheap to borrow money to buy real estate. Inflation and labor shortages have caused new home prices to increase, allowing existing home to sell for more
- Congress has continued to stimulate the economy with an excess of dollars (also contributing to the inflation we are currently experiencing.)
- Finally, due to Texas' robust economy and low cost of living, we attract 1,000 new residents to our state every single day.

As homes sell for higher prices, the market value for all our homes rise. This is reflected in the home valuations calculated by the local appraisal districts. The Rockwall & Collin Central Appraisal Districts are anticipating a high number of homes will see increased property valuation this year.

An extremely important piece of information to keep in mind: the Texas Legislature placed a cap on how much your homestead valuation tax can be increased from one year to the next. This means your home valuation may go up significantly from last year, but you can only be taxed on up to 10% of the increase, regardless of the market value for your home. We are anticipating a significant number of families in HD 33 hitting this cap this RCRW.ORG

year. This means many constituents will benefit from these caps set by the Texas Legislature. In addition, the Texas Legislature provides mandatory and optional exemptions for counties and local taxing authorities to adopt to provide homeowners with property tax relief.

The Rockwall and Collin County Central Appraisal Districts will begin sending out notices of appraised values this month. When you received yours, you will have two primary ways to lower your tax bill.

First, you should check that all exemptions you are eligible for have been applied. If you think you qualify for an exemption listed below but did not apply for it prior to this year's valuations, go ahead and fill out the application for exemptions in your respective county. Approved exemptions often help with valuations and tax bills for up to two years prior. Common exemptions:

- General Residence Homestead Exemption: the primary residence of an individual who lived in a residence as of January 1. A portion of the value of the home is deducted and not taxed. If you are not, make sure to contact your appropriate Central Appraisal District and apply for the exemption. (Rockwall CAD 972-771-2034) (Collin CAD 469-742-9200)
- Over 65 Exemption: This exemption might have been applied automatically depending on which County you reside in. However, double-check your valuation notice to make sure this exemption is listed if you are over 65.
- Disabled Person or Disabled Veteran Exemptions
- Surviving Spouse over the age of 55 Exemption
- Surviving Spouse of a Disabled Veteran or Surviving Spouse of a Member of the Armed Forces Killed in Action exemptions
- Disaster Exemption: if you house was substantially damaged in Winter Storm Uri and you applied for a disaster exemption, make sure it is listed on your valuation. This exemption is different from the exemptions listed above because it did need an application last year. If you did not apply for this exemption already, we are past the window to do so, but if you still have damages to your home from any cause, including a natural disaster, you can use that information if you protest your property valuation as it impacts the current market value of your home.

The second option to lower your tax bill is to protest your property value. If you believe your property tax valuation is higher than it should be, you can protest the appraisal online, by mail, or in person. The Rockwall CAD and Collin CAD websites have detailed instructions and forms on how to protest your valuation. Some individuals choose to hire a company to protest the appraisal for them, the Texas Legislature recently mandated the process be simplified so a homeowner could protest the appraisal on their own if they desired. Once a protest request is submitted, you are entitled to the documents used by the CAD for determining the value and other pertinent data for making your claim for a lower valuation. These documents include evidence of sales information, which is not automatically publicly available in Texas.

There is another key factor in the determination of your eventual tax bill. That is the tax rate set by your county, school district, city and/or local governing entities. They will set the tax rate based on the total market value taxed to come out to the tax revenue they need to operate and pay debt services. Nearly every taxing entity will see an increase in taxable value and therefore have a decrease in the tax rate.

The Texas Legislature also placed a cap on the amount of revenue that counties, cities, school districts, and other tax entities can collect. That is a 2.5% cap increase for school districts, and for all other entities, it's a 3.5% cap increase in tax revenue without voter approval. If a local entity adopts a tax rate which would collect more than 3.5% in revenue than the previous year, they must go to the voters to approve the rate. Almost everyone should see a tax rate decrease and it will be up to the voters to keep an eye on local government spending to ensure only the appropriate tax revenue increase is applied.

We hope all this information is helpful. The Texas Legislature has taken steps to limit the impacts of property valuation increases and the tax rates set by your local governments. We will continue to explore ways to lower your property tax burden and provide updates along the way, but you have a role to play in this as well. It is also

so important to get involved in your local governments and work with them to ensure property tax rates are set appropriately and limits are placed on spending. Elected officials represent you, and tax dollars are your dollars. Make sure you are involved in the process of choosing your representatives and the process of spending your tax dollars.
